- Scene Setters: Native **American Hunt**
- Large Project Base & Backdrop

Household Items

- · Craft Paints and Brushes
- · Cutting Surface
- · Disposable Cups
- · Hobby Knife
- · Measuring Spoons
- Newspaper
- · Pan for Water
- Pencil
- Scissors
- · Small Sticks and Tree-like **Twigs**

Did you know?

Native American tribes of the Great Plains Region hunted bison for survival. They used every part of the animal to make items like, food, clothing, tools, cooking utensils, pouches, containers, glue, fuel and jewelry. Before guns were adopted into their culture, Plains Indians killed bison with bows and arrows and spears.


Fun Fact!


Although bison appear large and lethargic, they are very agile creatures. They can run up to 35 mph and jump a 36" tall fence.



Rock Castings

- Mix and use Casting Plaster per Basic Use instructions.
- · Pour Casting Plaster into outside molds on Rock Mold tray until 1/2 full. Do NOT use inside mold.
- Repeat for a total of 6 rocks.





- Project Base & Backdrop
- Design a Backdrop that best fits your diorama.
- Cut out using a hobby knife.



- Paint
- Paint a landscape design. Keep in mind that newspaper wads and Plaster Cloth will cover the bottom 1/3.
- Test fit on Project Base with label area facing forward.



- Arrange rock castings on edge along front of Base.
- When you have decided on your preferred configuration, note depth and height of rocks. You will use this information when arranging newspaper wads (Step 5).
- Set rock casting aside.

NOTE: Rock castings can be broken into smaller pieces.



Newspaper Wads

- Arrange newspaper wads into desired terrain shape. Wads should be approximate height of rock castinas.
- Place wads far enough back on Project Base for rock castings to fit along
- Tape to hold wads in place



- · Set Backdrop aside
- Replace Backdrop with a temporary cardboard Side Panel.



- Plaster Cloth
- Cover newspaper wads with wet Plaster Cloth (3" strips), bumpy side up.
- Smooth each strip with wet fingers to fill holes in Cloth.
- Add 2 layers of Plaster Cloth



- Attach and Blend Rocks
- Attach rock castings to front of Plaster Cloth terrain.
- Poke 1" strips of wet Plaster Cloth around rock edges to fill in gaps.
- Let dry.



Leopard Spot

- Dilute Rock Colors in Mixing Tray.
- Paint rocks with the Leopard Spot paint technique.

NOTE: Save some diluted Rock Colors for Step 11.



Earth Undercoat

- Brush diluted Earth Undercoat over entire terrain (avoid rocks).
- · Let dry.

NOTE: Save some diluted Earth Undercoat for Step 11.



Talus

- Pour some Talus into remaining Rock Colors and Earth Undercoat. This will give you a variety of natural rock colors.
- Mix with Stir Stick.
- Let Talus dry on newspaper.



- Project Glue in Spray Bottle
- Spray diluted Project Glue on desired greenery areas.
- Using Plastic Cup and Sifter Lid, sprinkle Green Grass on Glue.



Ground Cover

- Sprinkle darker colors of Accents on Green Grass for realistic coloring.
- Apply Project Glue where you would like Shrubs. Press Shrubs into Glue.
- Spray again with diluted Project Glue to seal.



- Spray diluted Project Glue where you would like Talus
- Sprinkle Talus and spray again with diluted Project Glue to seal.

TIP! Attach Shrubs to small twigs to create small bushes.



- Puffy Tree Foliage
- Use Foliage Fiber to make Puffy Tree Foliage.
- Glue to landscape with Project Glue.



- Remove cardboard Side Panel.
- Glue twigs and other natural element in place.
- Attach Scene Setters and Backdrop with Project Glue. (Fig. 16a)



Labels

- Paint outside of Backdrop
- Label and add signage to your project.
